


### KITCHEN KORNER

We are pleased to be able to give you the prize winning cookie recipes which our ladies from the Villa Serena Center demonstrated at the Ohio State Fair in Columbus. They have graciously permitted us to make them available for you.

### MOM'S SURPRISE BARS OR DROP COOKIES

1/4 cup butter or margarine
1/2 cup brown sugar
1 egg
1 t grated orange peel

l cup all purpose flour sifted
1/2 t baking powder
1/2 t soda
1/4 cup milk
1/4 cup orange juice
1/2 cup chepped walnuts
1/2 cup snipped pitted dates

Cream butter and sugar until fluffy, add egg and orange peels. Beat well. Sift together flour, baking powder, and soda. Add to creamed mixture. Stir in milk, orange juice, nuts and dates.

Spread in greased ll" x 7" x 1½" pan. Bake at 3500 for 25 min. Cool, sprinkle with confectioners' sugar, or frost with orange glaze.

## Orange Glaze

 $l\frac{1}{4}$  cup sifted confectioners sugar  $l\frac{1}{4}$  t vanilla dash of salt 2 T orange juice or more if needed.

1/2 cup Crisco
1/2 cup sugar
2 eggs
1 t vanilla or any flavor
1\frac{1}{2} cups flour
1/2 t baking powder
1/2 t salt

Blend shortening with sugar. Beat thoroughly. These cookies depend on the air beaten into them.

Beat eggs one at a time. Stir in flour, salt, and baking powder.

Add your flavoring.

Drop by spoonsfull on cookie sheet.

Bake at 375° for 10 min.

## GOLDEN AGERS SPICE COOKIES


1/2 cup butter
