


BARBECUED BEEF ON BUN

1 lb. ground beef l large chopped onion 1 chopped green pepper 2 tablespoons sugar 1/2 teaspoon cloves 1 tablespoon mustard l tablespoon vinegar 1 teaspoon salt 1 cup catchup

Brown meat in a tablespoon hot fat until it is crumbly, but not hard. Combine and add remaining ingredients. Cover and simmer gently for 30 min. Serve on toasted bun. with bweed, forms, like, all

FOIL BAKED CHICKEN BREASTS

In a mixing bowl, combine l can mushroom soup

- l tablespoon minced green onion
 - 2 tablespoons minced parsley
 - l clove garlic (minced)
- 1/2 teaspoon crushed dried tarragon promise
 - a bit of thyme

Spread mixture over breasts and on inside of cavity. Place each piece of chicken on a square of aluminum foil. Bring edges together and seal with a drug store wrap. Fold corners under. Place on cookie sheet. Bake in hot oven 450° -- 20 to 25 minutes. Turn over and continue baking 20 minutes longer or until tender. Serve in foil. Each person opens his own package.

CRUMB CAKE

2 cups light brown sugar 2 ½ cups cake flour 1/2 pound margarine 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon

Crumb together like pie crust, or until mixture looks like coarse cornmeal. Take out 1 cup of the crumbs for the top.

To the remainder add

l beaten egg, l cup sour milk in which l teaspoon soda has been dissolved.

Mix well. Pour into a long flat pan, put crumbs on top and bake at 375° for 1/2 hour.


