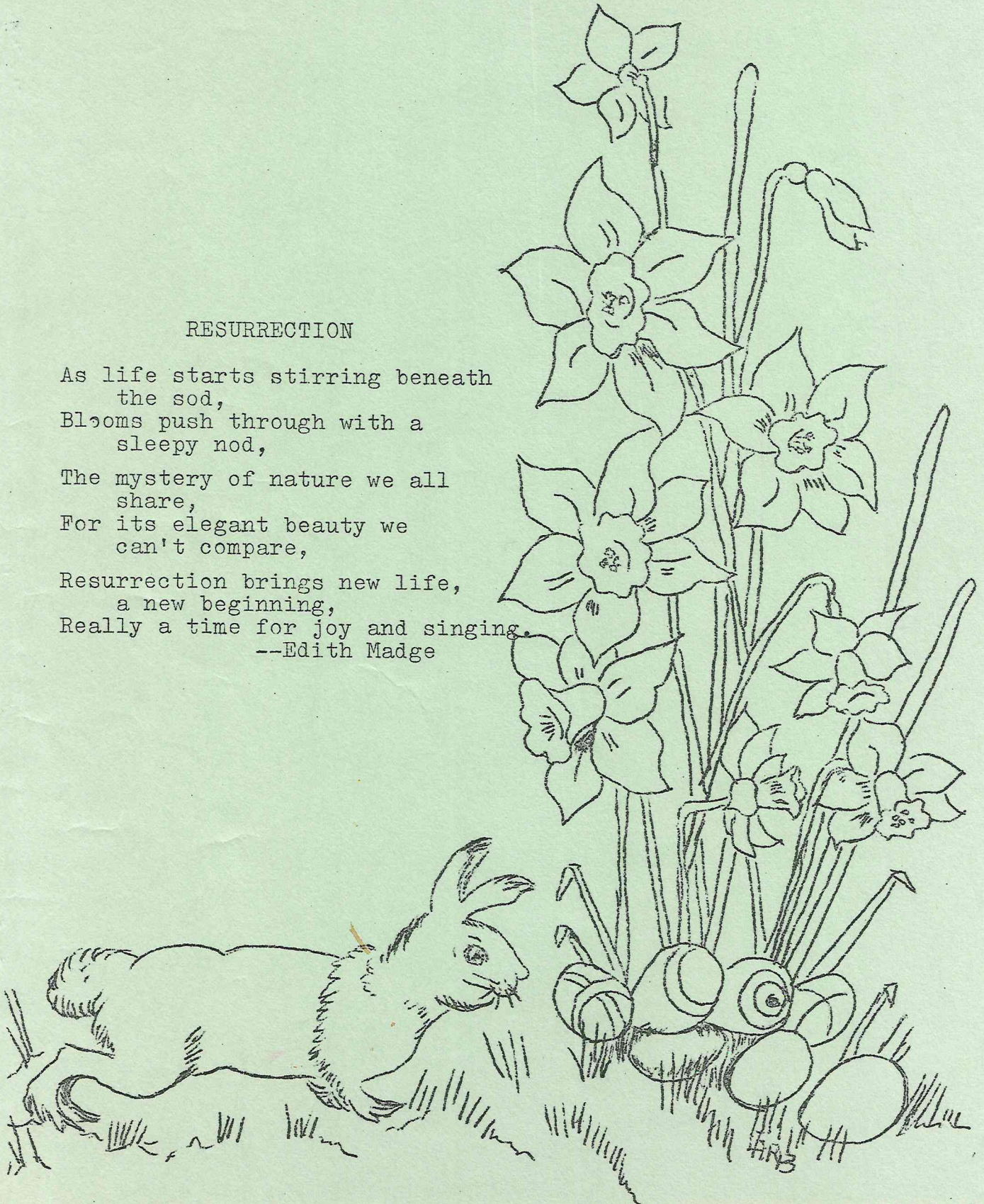

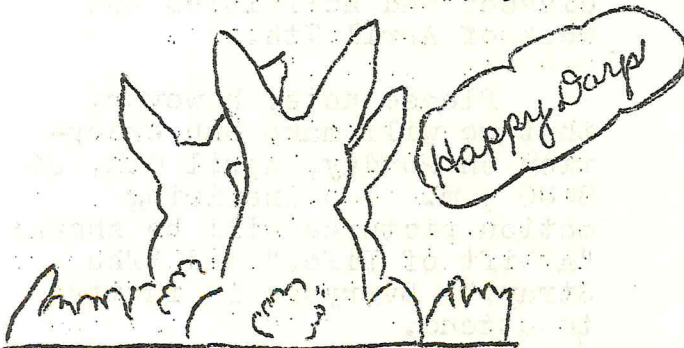

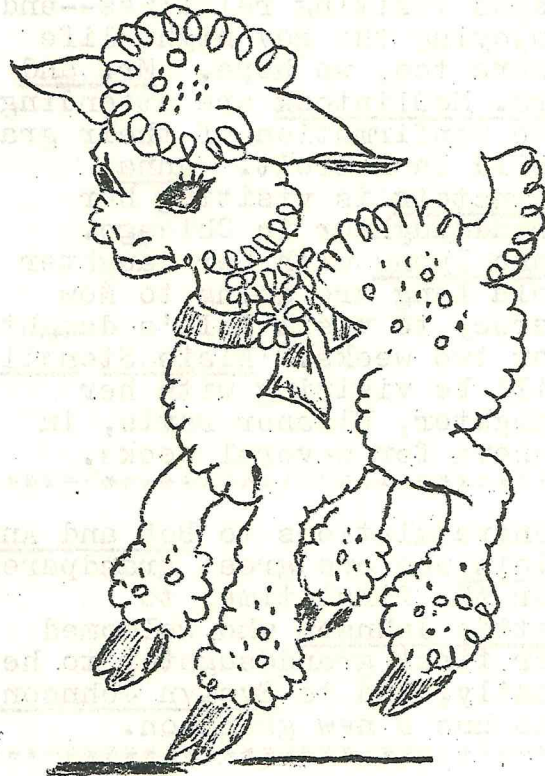

KITCHEN KORNER

BARBECUED BEEF ON BUN

- 1 lb. ground beef
- 1 large chopped onion
- 1 chopped green pepper
- 2 tablespoons sugar
- 1/2 teaspoon cloves
- 1 tablespoon mustard
- 1 tablespoon vinegar
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 cup catchup

Brown meat in a tablespoon hot fat until it is crumbly, but not hard. Combine and add remaining ingredients. Cover and simmer gently for 30 min. Serve on toasted bun.

FOIL BAKED CHICKEN BREASTS

- In a mixing bowl, combine
- 1 can mushroom soup
 - 1 tablespoon minced green onion
 - 2 tablespoons minced parsley
 - 1 clove garlic (minced)
 - 1/2 teaspoon crushed dried tarragon
 - a bit of thyme

Spread mixture over breasts and on inside of cavity. Place each piece of chicken on a square of aluminum foil. Bring edges together and seal with a drug store wrap. Fold corners under. Place on cookie sheet. Bake in hot oven 450° -- 20 to 25 minutes. Turn over and continue baking 20 minutes longer or until tender. Serve in foil. Each person opens his own package.

CRUMB CAKE

- 2 cups light brown sugar
- 2 1/2 cups cake flour
- 1/2 pound margarine
- 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon

Crumb together like pie crust, or until mixture looks like coarse cornmeal. Take out 1 cup of the crumbs for the top.

To the remainder add

- 1 beaten egg,
- 1 cup sour milk in which 1 teaspoon soda has been dissolved.

Mix well. Pour into a long flat pan, put crumbs on top and bake at 375° for 1/2 hour.

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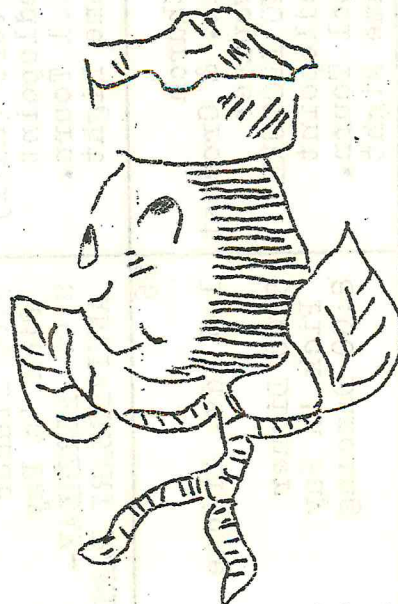
