



KITCHEN KORNER

LAMB STEW

1 lb. lamb shoulders (cut 1" cubes) 5 cups water 1 1/4 tsp. salt 1/2 bay leaf 2 cups diced carrots 2 cups diced potatoes (1/2" cubes)

Brown meat in heavy pan. Add water and seasonings. Cover, simmer 1 hour. Add carrots and cook 20 minutes; then add potatoes, cook another 20 minutes, or until meat and vegetables are done.

GRAHAM CRACKER CAKE

3 eggs (separated) 1 cup sugar 1/2 cup shortening l cup milk or applesauce 2 tsps. baking powder 1/2 tsp. salt 24 graham crackers (rolled fine) DREDGE WITH FLOUR: 1/2 cup raisins 1/2 cup nuts Beaten egg whites

Cream shortening and sugar, add beaten yolks, add applesauce or milk, with dry ingredients; add dredged raisins and nuts, add stiffly beaten egg whites. Bake in greased square or tube pan at 350 degrees, 45 minutes.

Frost with butter frosting or sprinkle with powdered sugar. -- Amelia Nagy

TUNA FISH SALAD ON PINEAPPLE RINGS

1 (13 oz.) can tuna fish l cup diced celery 2 tbls. minced green pepper 1 tbl. lemon juice 3/4 tsp. salt 6 tbls. mayonnaise 1 (No. 2 1/2 can sliced pineapple Lettuce

Combine all ingredients except pineapple and lettuce. Arrange drained pineapple, one slice on each bed of lettuce; top each slice with some of the tuna mixture. Serves 6.

CHICKEN-RICE CASSEROLE

2 tbsp. chopped onion 2 tbsp. chopped celery 2 tbsp. chopped green pepper 2 tbsp. chopped parsley 2 tbsp. butter 1 1/2 c. cooked rice 1 can mushroom soup Juice of half a lemon 3/4 tsp. salt 3/4 lb. chicken 3/4 c. Swiss cheese Paprika

Saute onion, celery, pepper and parsley in butter. Mix rice, soup, lemon juice, salt and chicken together; put into greased casserole. Grate or cut cheese into strips and place on top. Sprinkle paprika over casserole. Bake 30 minutes at 350 degrees. Shrimp may be substituted for chicken. Yield: 4-6 servings

EASTER AND PASSOVER MESSAGE


