

#### JAMES A GARFIELD

Have you ever been to Lawnfield? Originally a nine room house, it has been added to over the years since it was first purchased by James A. Garfield, a man of many talents and much intelligence. Carfield was forn in a log cabin in Orange, Ohio in 1831. He went to college in Hiram, Ohio, became a teacher of Greek and Latin and became president of the col-In 1859 he was nominated lege. to the Ohio Senate. In 1861, he was a colonel in the Ohio Volunteer Infantry in the Civil War. Later, at the request of Abraham Lincoln he took a seat in the House of Representatives and became leader of the Republican party. In 1881 he was elected 20th president of the United States. He was inaugurated on March 4th, and on July 2nd wa shot by a disgruntled office seeker.

President Garfield died in September 1881, and was laid to rest in Lakeview Cemetery. One of the wreaths was sent by Queen Victoria and is preserved in the library of Lawnfield, a National Historical Site located at 8095 Mentor Avenue. The Garfield Monument was built at a cost of \$225,000 donated in his remembrance. Also \$400,000 was donated to Mrs. Garfield in remembrance and with it she added to Lawnfield the library which became the first presidential library.

It is interesting to note that there was a Civil War Hospital located on Cleveland's west side. We usually don't think of the Civil War as having been in our territory. And how often

Let us enter this special time of the year with a new resolve to encompass everyone, make them your new friends and understand their ways.


Management and the Board of Trustees of the Villa Serena take this opportunity to wish you all a very Happy Passover and Easter and peace.
