



Lasagna Rolls

A unique twist on lasagna, an Emilia-Romagna region classic dish.



9 Lasagna, cooked as directed 1 (15 oz.) container ricotta cheese 1 (10 oz.) package frozen chopped spinach, well drained 1 cup shredded mozzarella cheese

1/4 cup grated Parmesan cheese

1 egg, slightly beaten

1 (26 oz.) jar tomato basil pasta sauce

Preheat oven to 350°. Combine ricotta, spinach, mozzarella, Parmesan, and egg. Spread about ½ cup of mixture on each lasagna noodle; roll up. Pour ½ cup pasta sauce into bottom of a 13 x 9 in. baking dish. Arrange lasagna rolls, seam side down, in dish. Top with remaining sauce. Cover with aluminum foil. Bake 35 minutes or until hot. Garnish as desired.
