I did my best today.

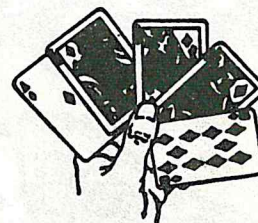

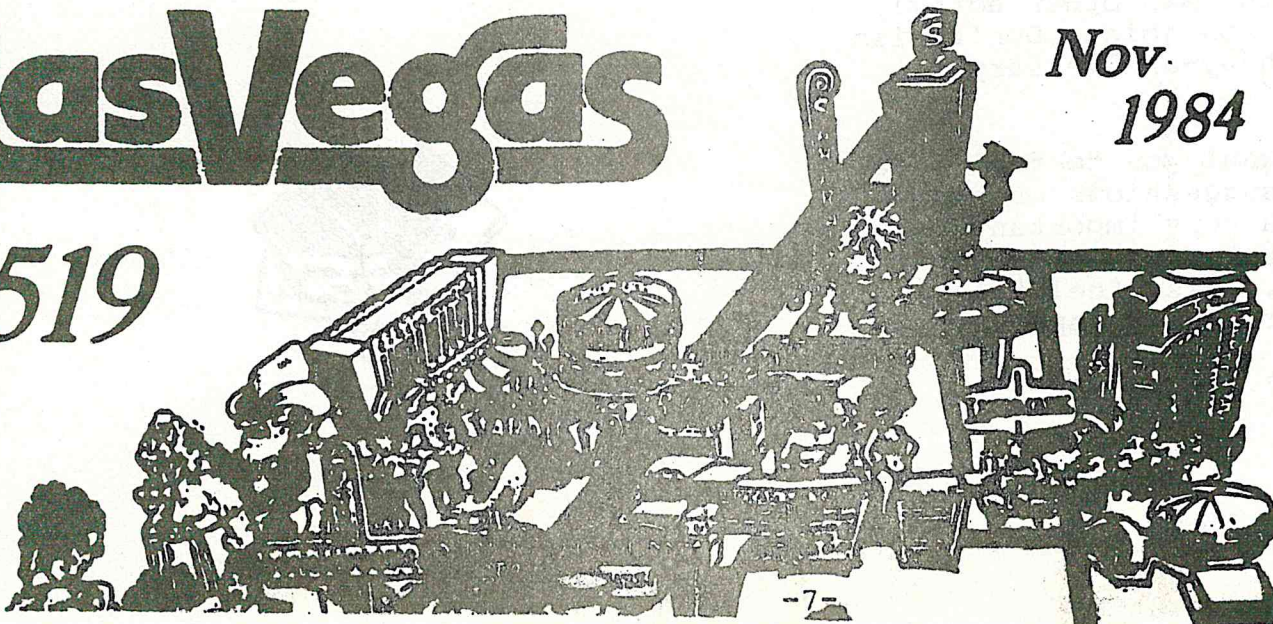
