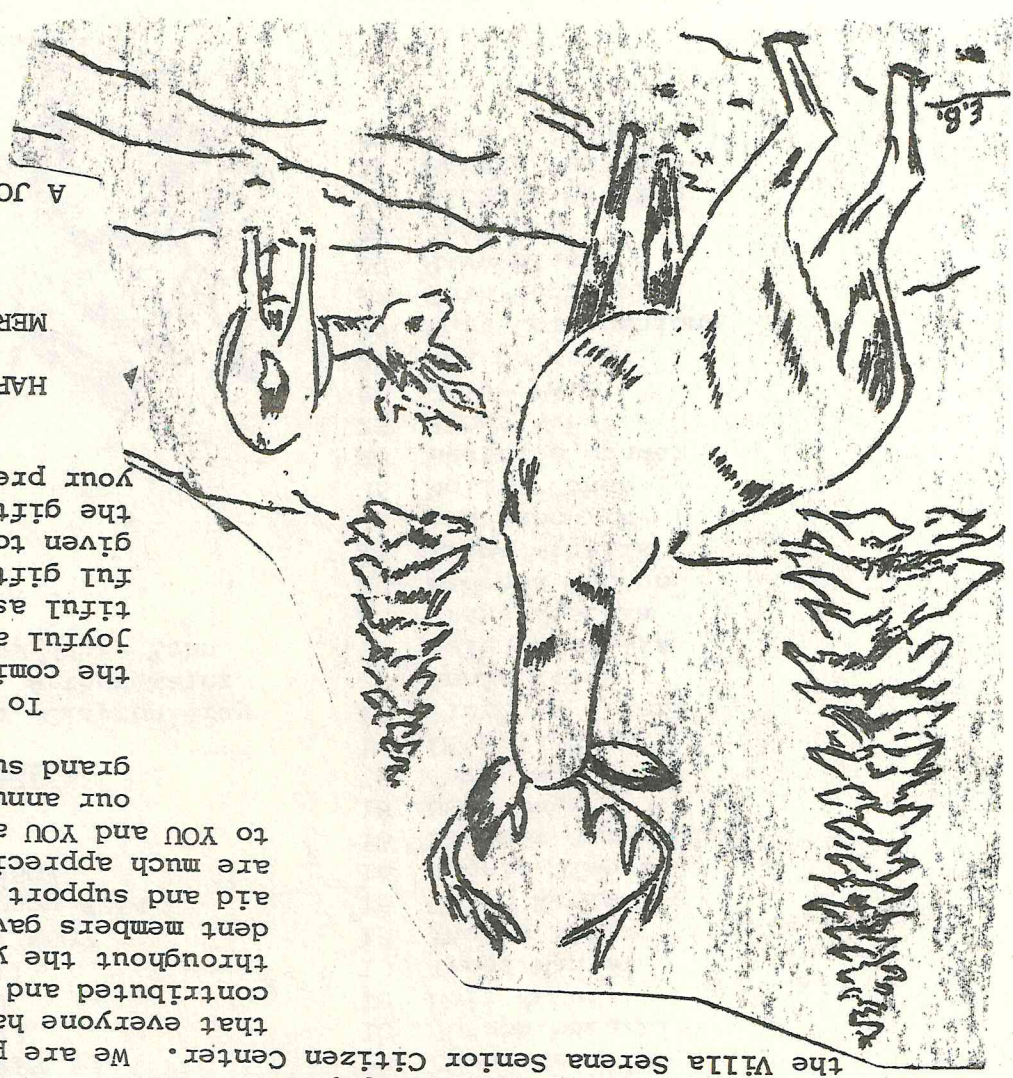

YUGOSLAV CHRISTMAS COOKIES

1 cup butter  
 1 1/2 cups sugar  
 1 egg yolk  
 1/4 tsp. salt  
 2 1/2 cups sifted all-purpose flour  
 1 cup currant jelly  
 4 egg whites  
 3/4 cup finely ground walnuts  
 1 tsp. lemon flavoring  
 1 cup coarsely chopped walnuts

Work butter until creamy. Stir in 1/2 cup sugar gradually.

Beat until fluffy. Beat in egg yolk and salt. Stir in flour.

Mix well. Pat into a thin layer in bottom of 9 x 13 x 2" pan.

Beat jelly slightly with a fork and spread on dough. Whip egg whites until stiff. Gradually

add remaining sugar, continuing to whip until mixture stands in peaks. Fold in ground nuts and

flavoring. Swirl over jelly. Sprinkle with chopped nuts. Bake

40-45 minutes at 350 degrees until brown. Cool in pan. Cut

into 1 1/2" squares.

Preparation: 20 min. Can do ahead.

Yield: 4 doz. Can freeze.

LEMON BUTTER

2 eggs, beaten

1 cup sugar (scant)

1 tsp. butter

Juice of 1 large lemon

Cook all ingredients over low heat, stirring constantly, until thick.

Serve warm or cold over hot rolls, biscuits, English muffins, etc.

Preparation: 1-2 min.

Cooking: About 10 min.

Yield: 1 cup

LEMON SQUARES

(specially good for a holiday treat!)

2 cups flour  
 1/2 cup powder sugar  
 1 cup butter or oleo  
 Blend with pastry blender. Press into a 13 x 9 oblong pan. Bake at 350 degrees for 20 minutes.

Topping

4 eggs  
 2 cups sugar

1/3 cup lemon juice

1/4 cup flour

1/4 teaspoon baking powder

Beat eggs, sugar and lemon juice until thick and frosty. Add flour

and baking powder. Mix. Pour over hot crust and bake 20 minutes

more at 350 degrees. Dust with powder sugar and cut into squares.

WINE SOUP

Dilute 1 quart light white wine with 1 pint of water, half cup sugar, or

enough to suit the taste; add one stick of cinnamon, a little lemon

peel and boil together for five minutes. Beat 3 egg yolks well and

gradually pour the boiling liquid on them and beat continually to

prevent curdling. Before serving, remove lemon peel and cinnamon stick.

Serve at once with crackers, toasted white bread cubes or macaroons.

No exact ingredients can be given on account of individual taste; some like

it stronger or sweeter.

This soup really is a remedy after exposure to cold.

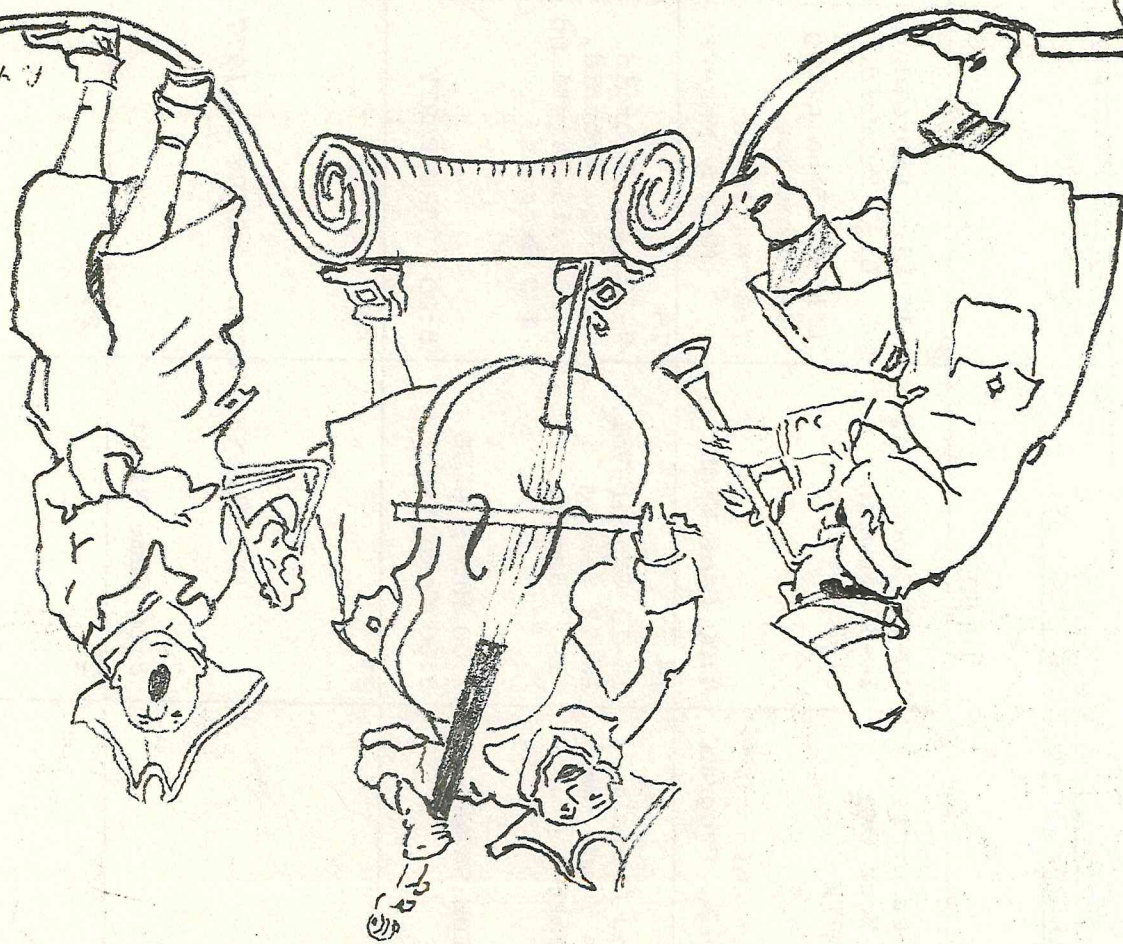

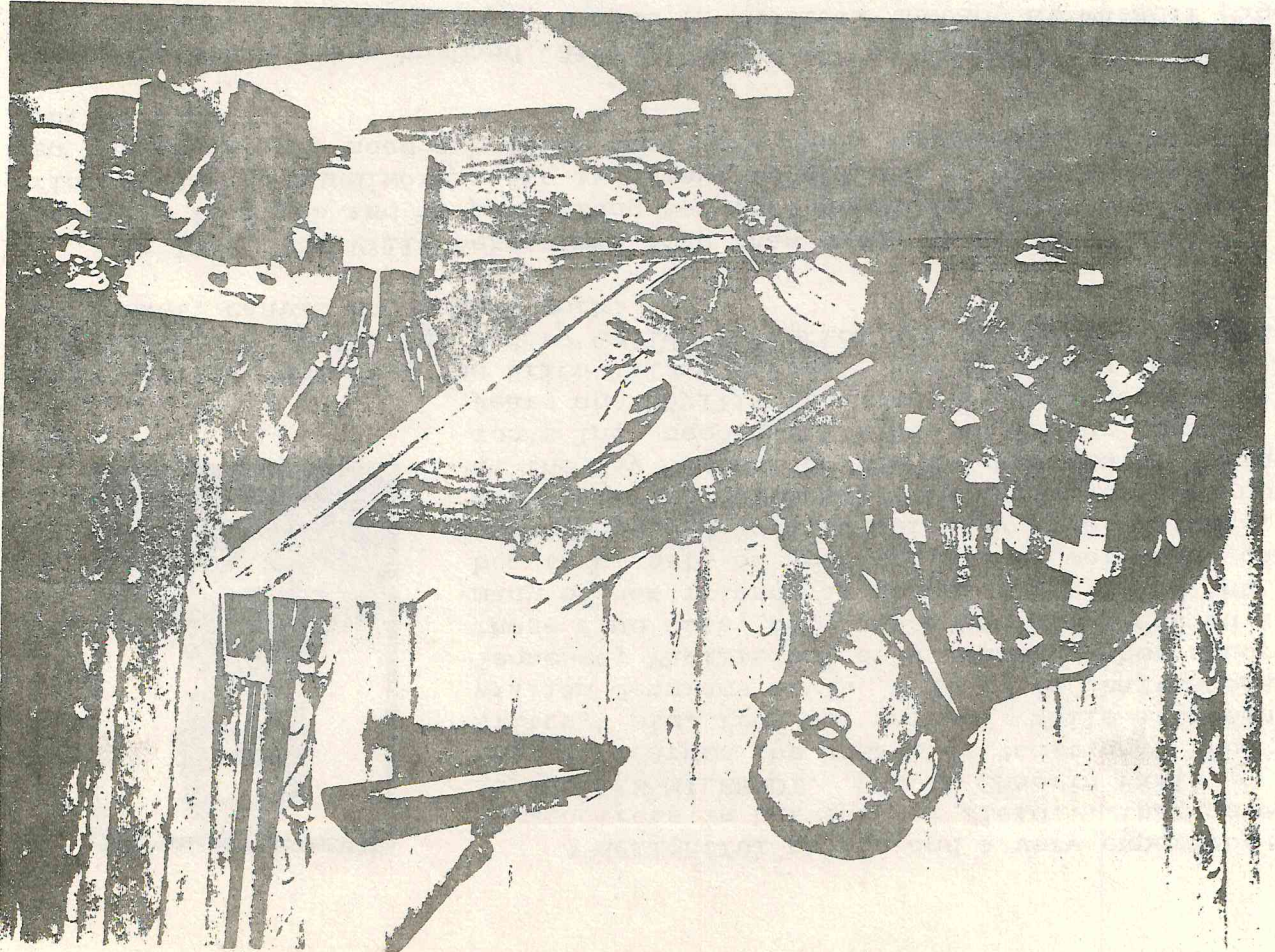

After a career in the commercial art field as senior advertising artist for the Lamp Division of the General Electric Company at Nela Park, RANDOLPH (RANN) YEAGER has a new career in the area of fine arts. He has conducted a painting class at the Villa Serena for seven years. He also teaches at the Euclid Beach Villa and for the Euclid Board of Education. In between classes he exhibits widely in the Cleveland area and paints in his studio. Right now he has an exhibit of his work in Diamond's Restaurant at Richmond Mall. He has won awards for his works and executes special art commissions. 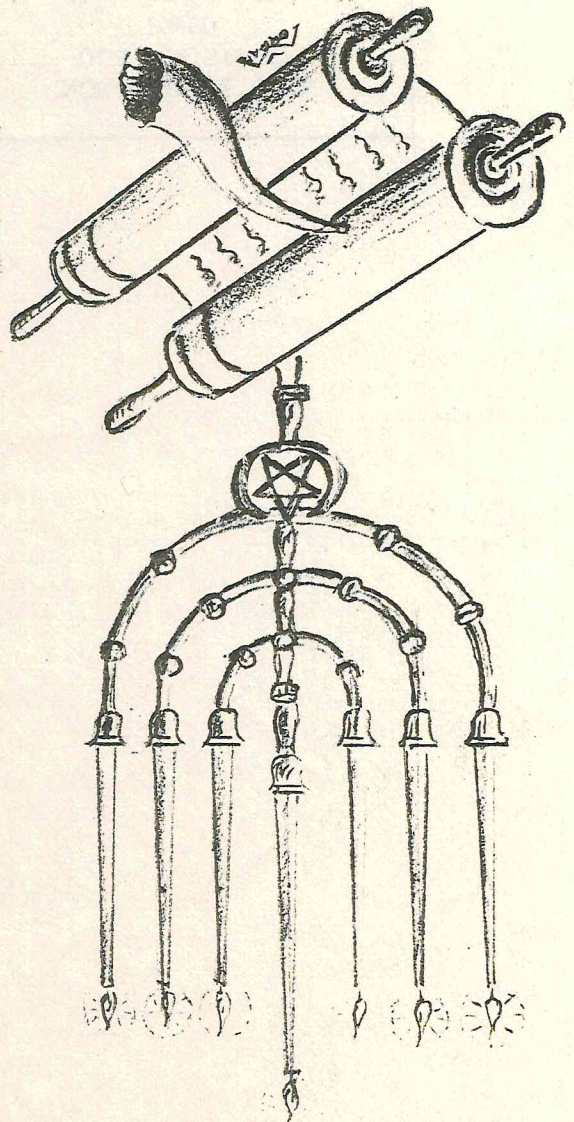
