

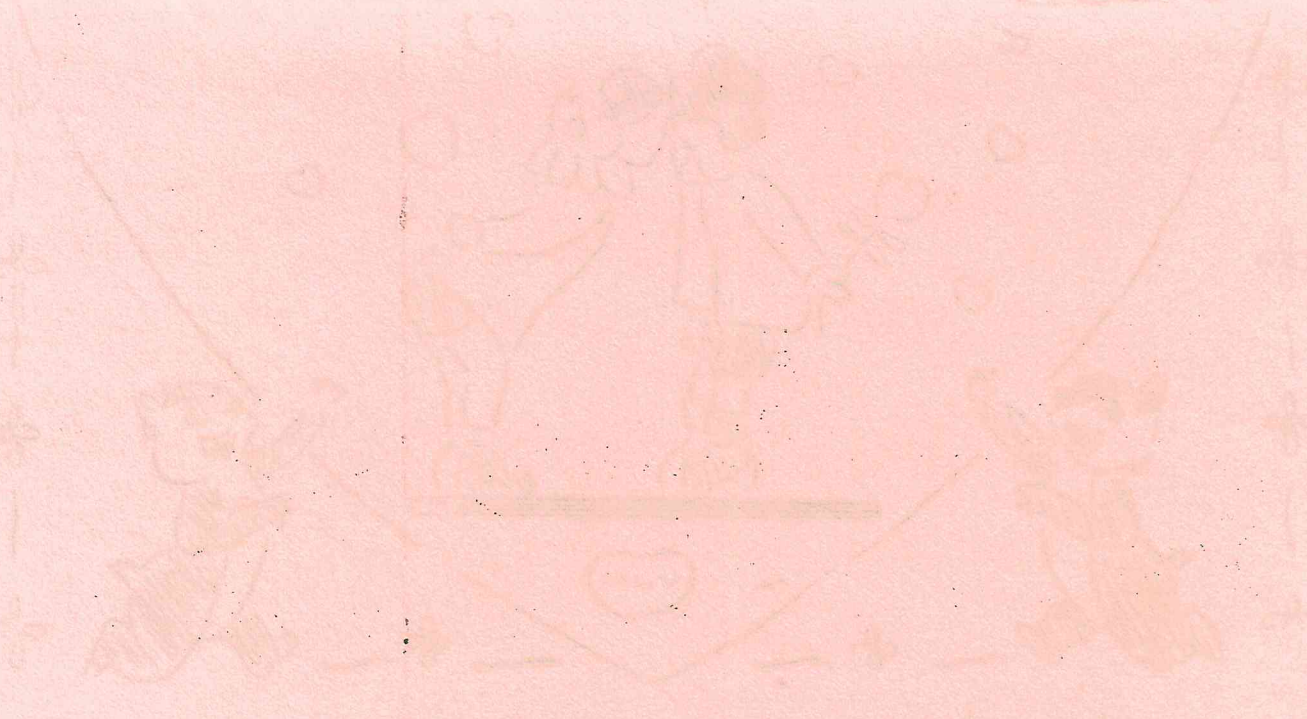

KITCHEN KORNER

UPSIDE DOWN CHOCOLATE CAKE

- 2 cups tiny marshmallows
- 1 cup packed brown sugar
- 1 pkg. devil's food cake mix
- 1 cup chopped walnuts
- 1/2 cup cocoa
- 2 cups very hot water

Place marshmallows in bottom of a greased 13" x 9" x 2" pan. Combine sugar, cocoa and hot water; pour over marshmallows. Spoon cake batter (prepared according to directions on package) over marshmallow mixture. Top with walnuts. Bake at 350° for 50 minutes. Cool in pan on cake rack for 10 minutes. Turn out on tray (I use a cookie sheet covered with aluminum foil). The cake may cling to the bottom of the pan, but carefully remove with a spatula and spread the melted marshmallows over the cake to make a smooth frosting.

If you wish to keep it in the cake pan for storage, wash the cake pan and put the cake back in--marshmallow side up. Put a few round toothpicks around the sides to let air under the pan and around the cake.

YOUNG BOYS DELIGHT

- 1/2 cup butter or margarine
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 2 1/2 plus 2 tablespoons flour

Form rolls...slice thin...brush with egg white and spread with sugar and ground nuts. Bake at 375° for 10-12 minutes.

NO CALORIE COOKIE!

- 1/2 cup butter or margarine
- 1 cup rolled graham crackers
- 1 cup coconut
- 1 cup butterscotch pieces
- 1 cup chocolate pieces (may be semi-sweet)
- 1 cup pecans
- 1 can sweetened condensed milk

Melt butter in 9"xl3" baking pan; sprinkle with cracker crumbs. Cover with coconut, butterscotch pieces, chocolate pieces and pecans. Pour condensed milk over layers. Bake in preheated 350° oven for 25 minutes. Cool. Cut into one-inch squares.

SIMULATED KEY LIME PIE

Mix together one six-ounce can frozen limeade concentrate and one cup evaporated milk. Fold in one envelope of Dream Whip mixed as per instructions. Pour into baked pie shell or graham cracker crust. Chill and serve. For a little eye appeal, sprinkle a little green sugar on top.

CREAM CHEESE KOLACKY

- 1 pkg. (3 oz.) cream cheese
- 1/4 lb. butter
- 1 cup flour

Mix and shape into a ball. Refrigerate overnight. Roll out and cut in squares. Fill with fruit or nut filling. Bake on ungreased sheet 350° for 10 or 12 minutes.

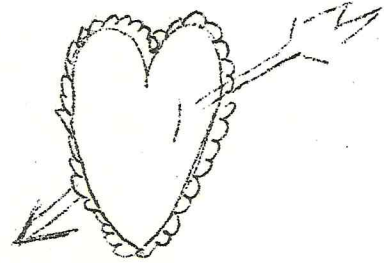

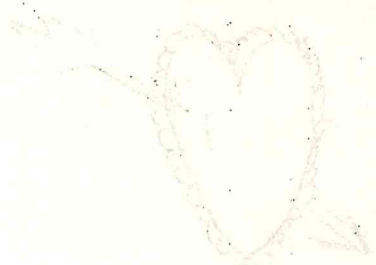
