


KITCHEN KORNER

GINGERED HAM SLICE

10 to 0 12 1 to 10 1 fully cooked center cut ham slice, in inch thick 1/2 cup ginger ale 1/2 cup orange juice 1/4 cup brown sugar l tablespoon salad oil 1½ teaspoons wine vinegar 1 teaspoon dry mustard ¼ teaspoon ground ginger 1/8 teaspoon ground cloves

Slash fat edge of ham. Combine remaining ingredients; pour over ham in shallow dish. Refrigerate overnight or let stand at room temperature 2 hours, spooning marinade over ham several times. Heat in a moderate oven (350°) about 30 minutes, brushing frequently with marinade. To serve, spoon remaining marinade over ham. Makes 5 or 6 servings.

HOT DEVILED POTATOES

Packaged instant mashed potatoes 1/4 cup dairy sour cream 1/2 teaspoon prepared mustard 1/4 teaspoon sugar l tablespoon snipped green onion

Prepare 2 servings potatoes peaches. Cook and stir till according to package directions. Stir in remaining ingredients. Spoon into 2 foil baking shells. Sprinkle with paprika. Bake at 350° about 20 minutes, or till heated through. Serves 2.

SAVORY TOMATO SOUP

1/4 cup chopped celery 2 T chopped green onion 1 T butter or margarine 2 teaspoons all-purpose flour 1 8-ounce can stewed tomatoes l cup water 1/4 cup dry white wine or water l chicken bouillon cube 2 slices crisp-cooked bacon, crumbled

Cook celery and onion in butter till tender but not brown. Blend in flour. Add remaining ingredients, except bacon; cook and stir till slightly thick. Reduce heat; cook slowly 15 minutes, stirring occasionally. Garnish with bacon. Makes 2 servings.

PEACH COBBLER

2 teaspoons cornstarch 3 tablespoons brown sugar 1/4 cup cold water 1½ cups sliced fresh peaches l tablespoon butter or margarine 1 teaspoon lemon juice Biscuit Topper

Mix first 3 ingredients; add bubbly. Add butter and lemon juice; pour into 2 individual casseroles. Add Biscuit Topper.. Bake at 400° for 25 minutes. Serves 2.
