



Consumers League Warns Against Mixing Food and Medication

The Associated Press has reported on a warning issued by the National Consumers League concerning the admixture of certain combinations of food and prescription or over-the-counter medicines. Their campaign is an attempt to warn people using such drugs as to what food and drug combinations may cause health problems.

While doctors are supposed to warn against mixing different medicines which interact, problems which arise from mixing medicine and other substances such as food, alcohol, and herbal supplements receive less attention.

High doses of Vitamins E and K, and food such as grapefruit juice, cheese, sau-

sage, colas, caffeine, and bananas may clash with some medicines.

The League has issued a pamphlet titled "Food and Drug Interactions." It may be obtained by sending \$1.00 and a self addressed, stamped

envelope to National Consumers League, 1701 K St. NW, Suite 1200, Washington, D. C., 20006. More on this vital subject later.


