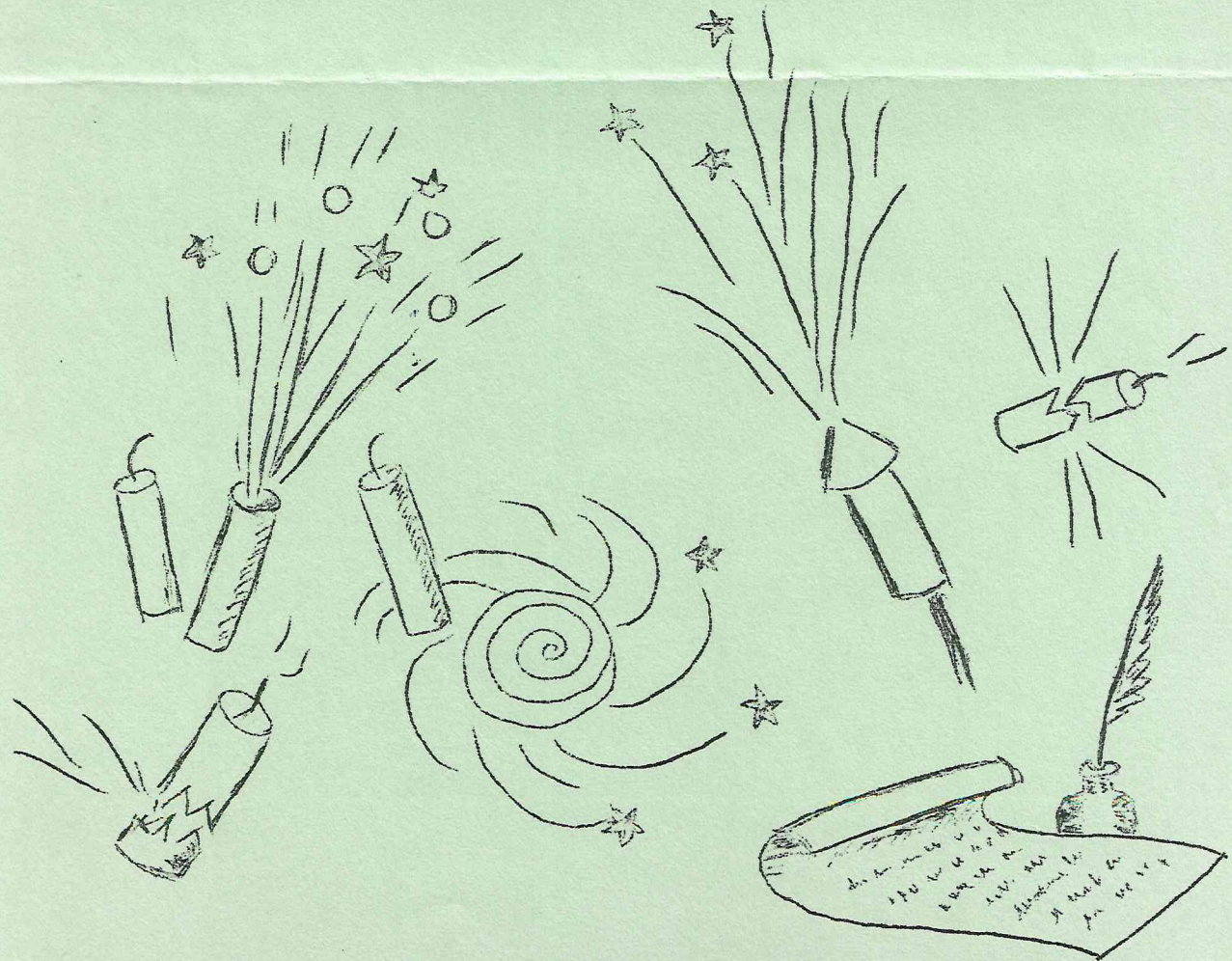
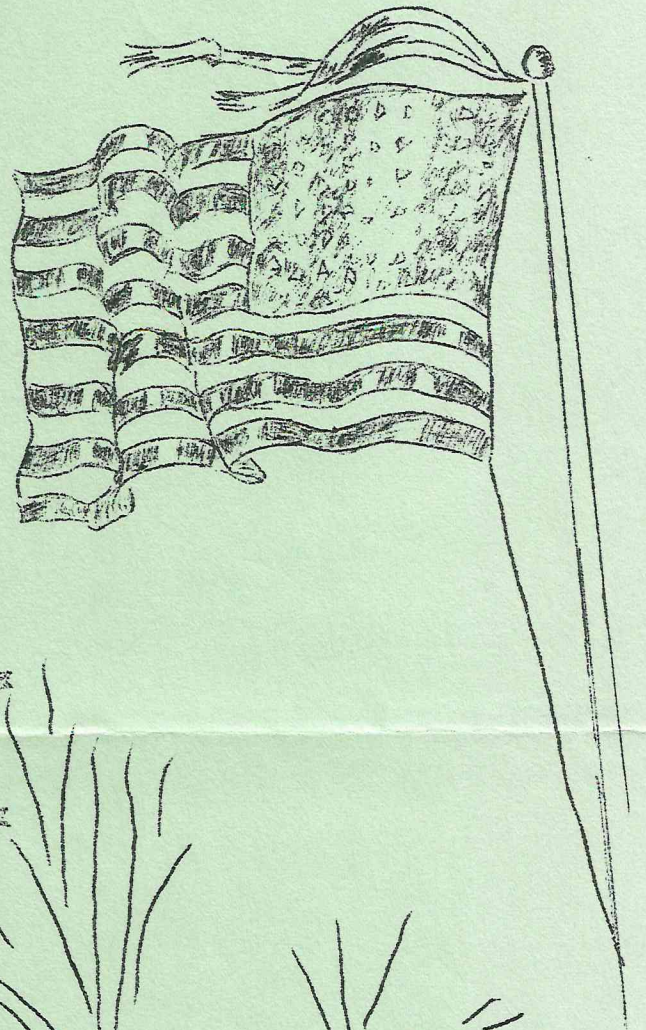

KITCHEN KORNER

PECAN CHICKEN A LA KING

- 2 tablespoons butter or margarine
- 1/4 cup chopped celery
- 1 chicken bouillon cube
- 2 tablespoons all-purpose flour
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1/8 teaspoon poultry seasoning
- 1 1/4 cups milk
- 1 teaspoon lemon juice
- 1 cup cubed cooked chicken
- 1 tablespoon chopped canned pimiento
- 1/4 cup coarsely chopped pecans

In medium saucepan, melt butter; cook celery in butter till tender. Add bouillon cube; crush with back of spoon. Stir in flour, salt, and poultry seasoning. Add milk all at once. Cook, stirring constantly, till mixture thickens and bubbles.

Stir in lemon juice, chicken, pimiento, and all but a few of the pecans. Cook and stir till mixture is heated through. Spoon creamed chicken over warm waffles. Garnish with remaining pecans. Makes 2 servings.

CARAMEL STACK-UPS

Fold 1 tablespoon caramel sundae topping into 1/2 cup whipping cream, whipped. Frost 8 chocolate wafers with some whipped cream mixture. Stack frosted cookies 4 high; frost sides. Chill several hours. Drizzle with extra sundae topping before serving. Serves 2.

When making potato salad, cook potatoes with a bay leaf and some onion.
