Baked Haddock Au Gratin

This recipe was in The Voice for July of 1976. It sounds delicious, and it won't heat up your kitchen too much on a hot day.



2 tbsp. Butter or margarine

2 tbsp. Flour

½ tsp. Salt

1 cup milk

½ cup grated sharp cheese

2 tsp. Lemon juice

1 lb. Haddock fillet

bread crumbs

Melt butter in sauce pan. Add flour and salt. Stir until blended. Add milk slowly and bring to a boil, stirring constantly. Remove from heat. Blend in cheese and lemon juice.

Arrange haddock in a greased shallow baking dish. Pour cheese sauce over top. Sprinkle with bread crumbs. Bake at 350° for 30 min.

Serves 3. Can do ahead.

Food and Drug Interactions

A bulletin from the National Consumers League, in cooperation with the U.S. Food and Drug Administration, states that drugs "have powerful ingredients", and diet and lifestyle can sometimes have a significant impact on a drug's ability to work... This may make them less effective or may cause dangerous side effects or other problems. Make sure your doctor and pharmacist know about every drug you are taking, including nonprescription drugs and any dietary supplements such as vitamins, minerals, and herbals ... remember that many drugs interact with other drugs and may cause serious medical conditions."

This month, the subject of <u>arthritis and</u> pain will be concluded.

<u>Corticosteroids</u> are used to provide relief to inflamed areas of the body. They reduce swelling and itching, and help relieve allergic, rheumatoid, and other conditions.

Examples include methyprednisolone. (Medrol), prednisone (Deltasone), prednisolone (Pediapred, Prelone), and cortisone acetate (Cortef).

Interaction: Take with food or milk to decrease stomach upset.

Narcotic Analgesics are available only with a prescription. They provide relief for moderate or severe pain. Codeine can also be used to suppress coughing. Some of these medications can be found in combination with non-narcotic drugs such as acetaminophen, aspirin, or cough syrups. Take caution: use only as directed by a doctor or pharmacist. They may be habit forming and can cause serious side effects when used improperly.

Some examples are codeine/acetaminophen (Tylenol #2, #3, #4), morphine (Roxanol, MS Contin), oxycodone/acetaminophen (Percocet, Roxicet), meperidine (Demerol), and hydrocodone/acetamenophen (Vicodin, Lorcet).

Interaction: Avoid alcohol because of sedative side effects and use caution where motor skills are involved, such as driving.

He was inspired by the principles of St. Francis and wanted to better the future of older adults and, in particular, he wanted a place where older Italians could live their later years.

to buy land – but how to build? Few buildings for the well elderly existed in the United States at that time. Mr. Alesci wanted no hotellike atmosphere but a fashionable environment and programs of activities for everyone.

Eventually Frank Alesci and Frank Pitrone found their way to the office of Howard Chesler who went to Washington D.C. for a new government loan program specifically for apartments for Senior Citizens. Joining with the Italian Sons and Daughters of America, the founders set the guidelines that for years to come would be the envy of other properties in Cleveland and The

United States.

Building began in 1965 and by November of 1966 Howard Chesler and Mary Calogero began spending people know the story of our origin. weekends showing people around a very unfinished Villa Serena. Through the cold winter they described the benefits there would be for future residents and in six months every suite was filled. The rent at that time was \$90 for an efficiency, unheard of at that time! Because government funds did not The money they collected was used allow for a Senior Center, the sponsoring organizations donated all furniture and equipment we now have on our first floor and the residents began to enjoy the many, many activities that were offered. And what a time they had! Early Villa Voices list enough activities and events to tire a teen-ager. With volunteers helping everywhere, and Howard and Mary tirelessly involved with people and programs, we became the wonderful Villa Serena of today.
