


For all Pick 'n Pay dinners a charge of \$1.00 will be made for the ticket. This amount will be applied to the total cost of your dinner.


If the ticket is not returned at least 24 hours prior to the dinner, absolutely no money will be refunded.

KITCHEN KORNER

CHILLED JUICES FOR COCKTAILS

Place shaved ice in cocktail glasses and fill with one of the following chilled juices:

- 1. Equal parts tomato and sauerkraut juice
- 2. Coca-Cola with fresh lime juice
- 3. Grapefruit juice topped with minted cherries
- 4. Equal parts prune and pineapple juice

FROZEN STRAWBERRY CHEESE SALAD

- l 16-ounce package frozen strawberries
- l carton cottage cheese l cup whipping cream

Partially defrost strawberries and combine with cottage cheese. Fold in whipped cream and place in mold to freeze. Defrost approximately 20 minutes before serving. Top with whipped cream and maeaschino cherry.

A good hint-- If a person cannot ride without getting sick, try chewing on whole olives; they make you thirsty, but will keep your stomach in place,

Milk, in being boiled, frequently sticks to the pan. To prevent this, rinse the pan in hot water before using.

LAZY DAISY CAKE

2 eggs 1 cup sugar

l teaspoon vanilla

l cup sifted cake flour

l teaspoon baking powder

1/8 teaspoon salt

2 tablespoons butter or margarine

1/2 cup milk

Beat eggs until light. Gradually add sugar and vanilla. Sift together flour, baking powder and salt; add gradually to the egg mixture, stirring after each addition until all flour is moistened and there are no lumps. Melt butter in saucepan and add milk, heating to lukewarm. Add this to flour mixture, stirring until smooth. Spread in square pan, 9 x 9 x 2. Bake at 350°F for 25 minutes. Spread with Lazy Daisy Frosting and place under broiler until lightly browned.

FROSTING

8 tablespoons brown sugar 4½ tablespoons butter 3 tablespoons cream 1½ cups moist coconut

Combine all ingredients, but coconut and place over low flame to melt the soft ingredients. Stir well and add the coconut. Spread on cake as soon as it comes out of oven and place under broiler until lightly browned.
