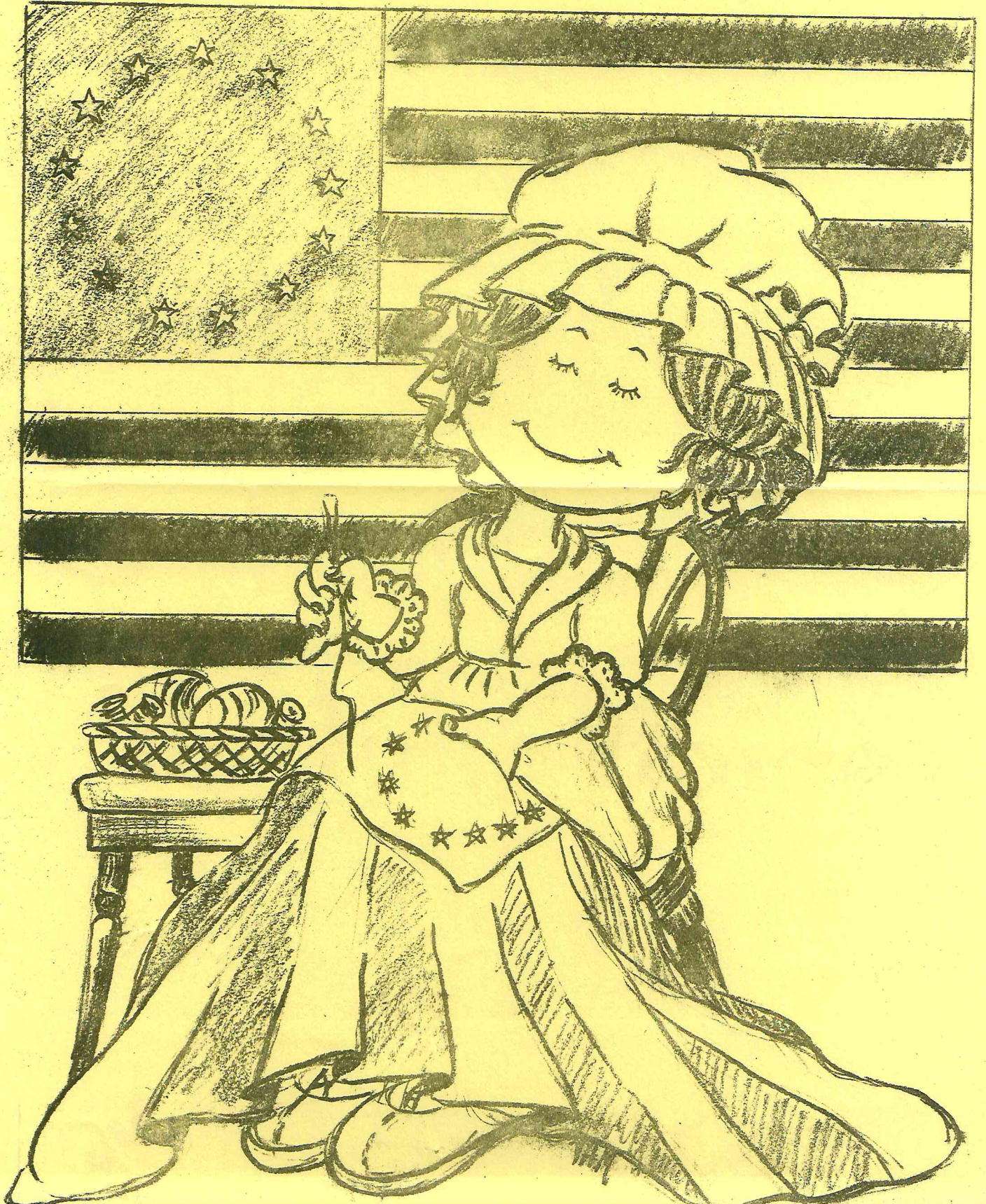

KITCHEN KORNER

FLORIDA ORANGE PIE

- 2 - 8 ounce packages of cream cheese
- 1/4 cup fresh orange juice (or orange juice concentrate)
- The grated rind of 2 oranges
- 3 teaspoons of lemon juice
- Orange food coloring as necessary
- 1/2 pint of heavy whipping cream
- 1-1/4 cup of confectioner's sugar
- 9" prepared graham cracker pie shell
- Mandarin orange sections

Heartily blend the cream cheese and sugar with the orange juice and grated rind. Beat the whipping cream until thick and full bodied. Fold both mixtures together adding lemon juice, food coloring, and diced orange sections. Pour into chilled pie shell and continue chilling until firm. Serve topped with mandarin orange sections. --Amelia Nagy

CORNED BEEF AND NOODLE CASSEROLE

- 1 can corned beef
- 1 can cream of chicken soup
- 1 C milk
- 1/4 lb. American cheese, diced
- 1 - 8 oz. pkg. noodles
- 1/4 C minced onion
- Bread crumbs

Combine ingredients in buttered casserole. Sprinkle top with bread crumbs. Bake at 350° for 1 hour.

LOW CALORIE PEACH 'N' CREAM SALAD

- 1 T pure gelatin
- 1/2 cup cold water
- 1 cup boiling water
- 1 T Sucaryl
- 4 T lemon juice
- 1/2 cup sour cream
- 1 cup chopped peaches

Soften gelatin in 1/2 cup cold water; add boiling water; stir to dissolve. Add Sucaryl and lemon juice; chill slightly. Blend in sour cream; chill until mixture begins to thicken. Fold in peaches. Turn into a 3-cup mold; chill until set. Unmold on salad greens to serve. Makes 6 servings. Each serving contains 35 calories. -- Amelia Nagy

WACKY CAKE

- 1-1/2 C sifted flour
- 1 C sugar
- 1/2 tsp salt
- 1 tsp baking soda
- 3 T cocoa
- 1 T vinegar
- 6 T salad oil
- 1 tsp vanilla
- 1 C cold water

Sift dry ingredients into ungreased 8x8x2 pan. Level off, then make 3 holes. Into them put the vinegar, oil and vanilla. Pour cold water over all and mix thoroughly with a spoon. Bake at 350° for 25-30 minutes.

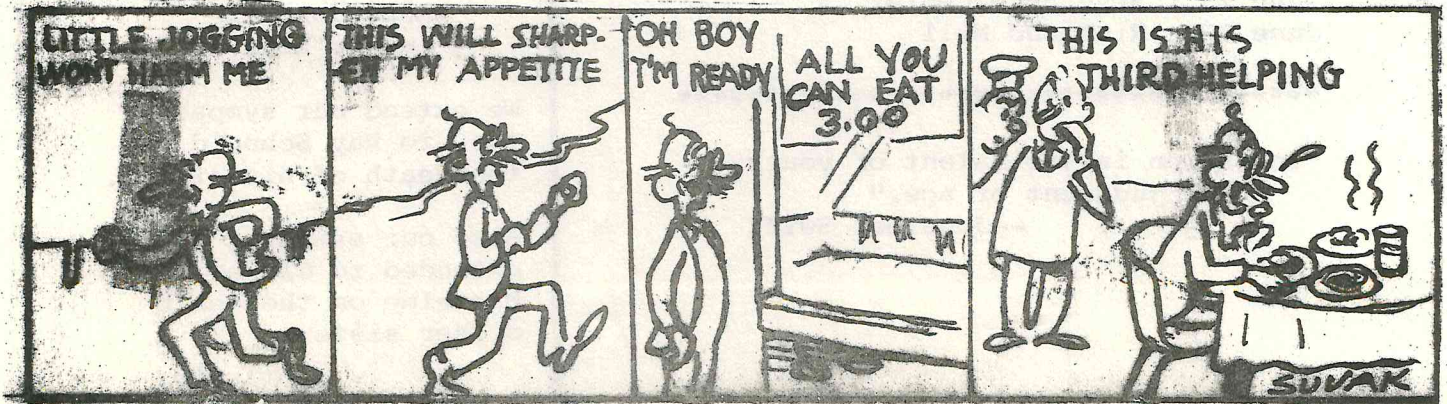
