The Longevity Revolution and Its Impact

"We need a massive effort to reduce and, for many of the elderly, eliminate the chief threats to their independence. . . The more independent the elderly are, the less expensive nursing home and institutional care they require. Independence is what the elderly want most."

— Former Health, Education and Welfare Secretary
Joseph A. Califano, Jr.

The United States is in the midst of an unprecedented demographic revolution. This "Longevity Revolution" is dramatically changing the fabric of American society. For a growing number of seniors, growing older is not an idle time of rest and looking backward, but a productive period where new careers, interests and activities are pursued with vitality. Signs of this cultural shift are everywhere. Mandatory retirement is a thing of the past. Travel plans are aggressively marketed to older consumers. Movies and television shows, as well as commercials, portray older people in active, vital roles. With increasing health, vigor and independence among the older population comes a natural human desire to enjoy all of these commodities for as long as possible. This chapter examines the demographics of the Longevity Revolution, the costs of caring for America's elderly today and in the future, and how scientific research in human aging is essential to increasing the health and independence of older Americans.

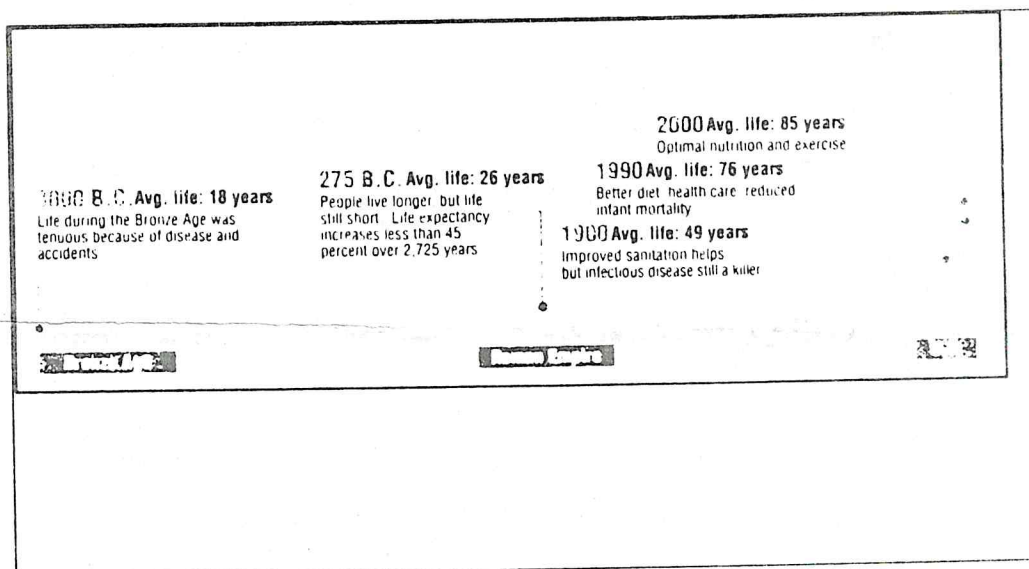
The Older Population

Longevity has increased at an astonishing rate in the 20th century. Dr. Robert N. Butler, chairman of geriatric medicine at Mount Sinai Medical School in New York, notes that there has been a greater increase in average life expectancy at birth during this century than there was from the

time of ancient Rome to the year 1900. Medical and scientific breakthroughs, improved health habits and rising standards of living have combined to raise the average life expectancy from 47 years in 1900 to 72.3 for men and 79.1 for women in 1992.

Future Growth

But this Longevity Revolution is still in its infancy. The next major factor contributing to the growth in older Americans will be the aging of the post-World War II "Baby Boom," defined by demographers as those born from 1946 to



Currently, Americans age 65 and older constitute 13 percent of the population, or 33.6 million persons. Because of longer life expectancy and the large number of people reaching the oldest ages, Americans age 85 and older represent the fastest growing segment of the population.

1964. This is the largest single generation in American history, and its oldest members will begin turning 65 in 2011, ushering in a "Senior Boom." Their numbers will skyrocket, from 40.1 million elderly persons in 2011 to at least 70.2 million by 2030.

Sister Malachy Culhane: 1901- Rochester, MN

The search for models for the *Aging in America* project led me to Rochester, Minnesota. On a gently sloping hill looking over the city is the Assisi Heights Convent. The driveway curved up past the beautifully attended grounds that surrounds the three story hand-cut stone Chapel and Mother House. I had been invited to visit a most unusual long term health care facility and research a prospective model for the *Aging in America* series, Sister Malachy Culhane.

Sister Malachy was born October 29, 1901 in Canton, South Dakota. She was fourth of thirteen children, nine girls and four boys. She attended Good Council Academy and graduated from a business course in 1920. Two years later she joined the community of the Sisters of the St. Francis Order at Assisi Heights in Rochester, MN. She continued her education at St. Teresa College in Winona, MN. After receiving her degree, she taught school for fifty years before retiring to Assisi Heights in 1975.

I had been invited to stay at the convent as I did my research for this drawing. Being the son of a Protestant minister, my expectations did not conform to the reality of Assisi Heights. The austere "cell" with sparse furnishings turned out to be a comfortable room with a private bath. The Sisters welcomed me and my wife as honored guests into their wonderfully

happy and active religious community. Sister Malachy gave us a tour of the convent and told the history of the Sisters of Assisi Heights. It was the Sisters who began St. Mary's Hospital after a major tornado killed over a hundred people and wounded scores of others in the town of Rochester. Their doctor was Dr. Mayo. He later began the Mayo clinic and the sisters staffed the clinic with nurses. They saw needs and filled them. Others, as Sister Malachi had done, were teachers. Each to her own calling, they unselfishly devoted their lives to the service of God and others.

Sister Malachi often goes to the inner court garden to "pray and enjoy God's wonders." I asked her to pose for me beside the statue of St. Francis among the flowers. While posing she shared her feelings about her life and retirement at Assisi Heights. She is enjoying her retirement in the excellent health care center within the Mother House with its caring nurses and loving Sisters. She says she is in her "nifty nineties," thanks God that she has use of her five senses and is able to partake of most of the Community prayers and activities. "I look to heaven for the time when a loving and merciful God will call me home," she states with a smile that radiates from her face and touches the deepest part of my soul.

The sisters at Assisi Heights Convent are included in the community activities in whatever capacity they are capable of participating. There are no feelings of isolation, neglect or abandonment to fate. They are blessed by their faith.

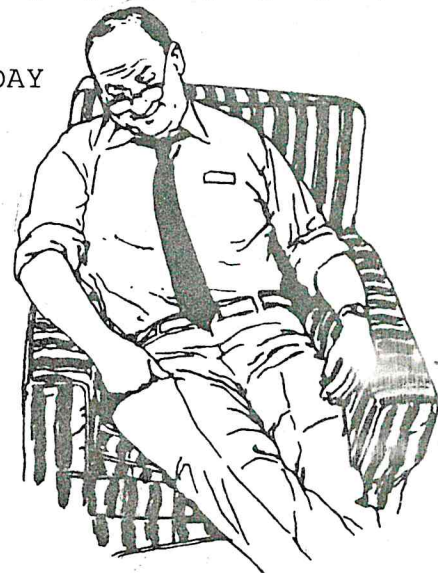

Dinner will be THURSDAY, JUNE 29th starting at 5:00 P.M. followed by some good ol' American flag waving music, dancing and singing!

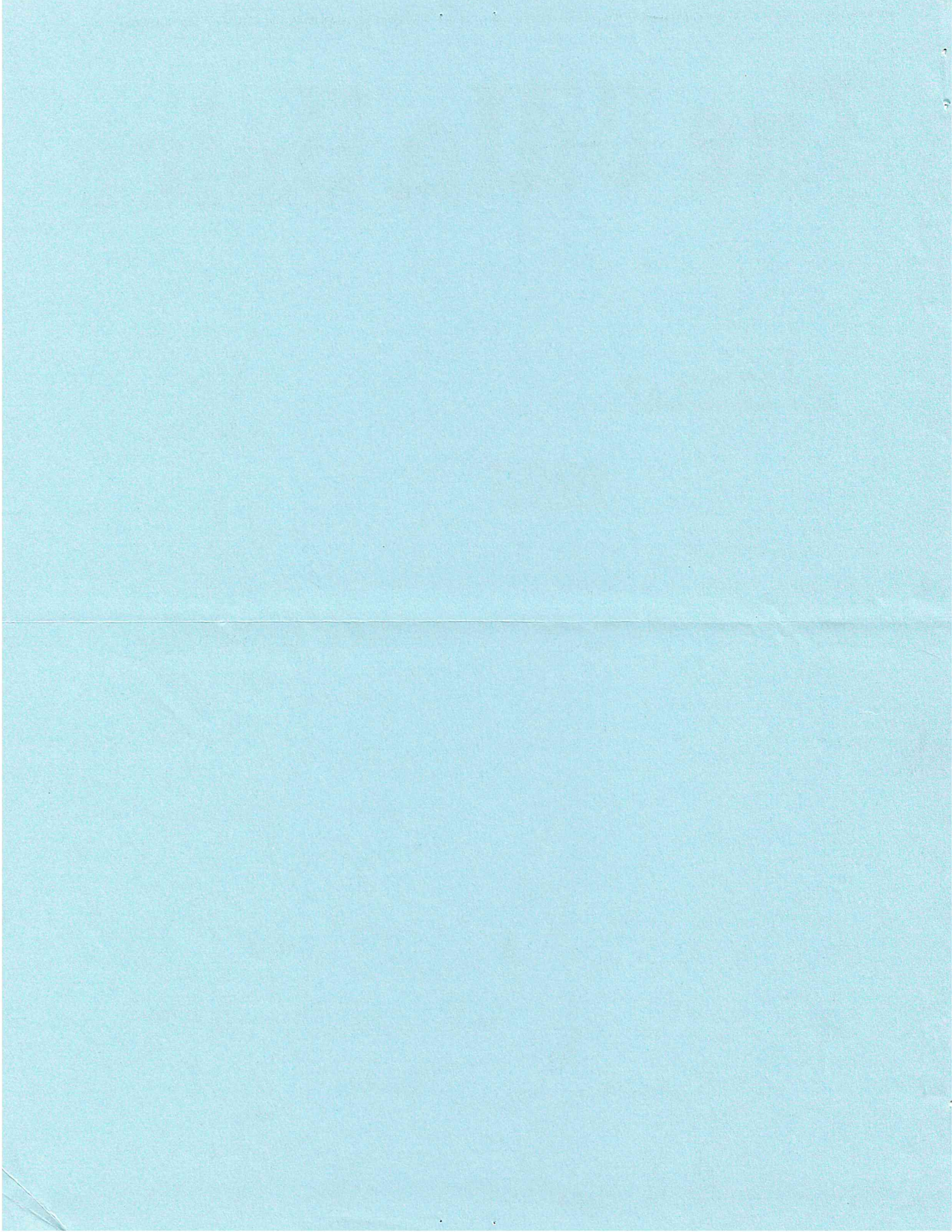
Don't forget to wear your favorite red, white and blue for this special time.
