"TO YOUR HEALTH"

Interrupting a Heart Attack: a Recent Advance

To be able to interrupt a heart attack while it is in progress is to gain crucial time for the patient, and very often to save a life. In the past decade, scientific research has focused intensively on this problem. Out of that effort an important new medication has emerged, called TPA, which has now been approved for use by the Food and Drug Administration.

WHAT IS TPA?

TPA (tissue-type plasminogen activator) is a clot-dissolving drug. A heart attack is caused by the formation of a clot in one of the arteries that is supplying essential blood to the heart. TPA, administered intravenously, restores blood flow to the heart by dissolving the clot. Because TPA is "clot specific"—acting only on a blood clot—it represents an advance over previous medications for interrupting heart attack, which had a blood-thinning effect throughout the body. Recent studies show that TPA is already dramatically increasing the survival rate for heart attack patients.

HOW IMPORTANT IS THE PROMPT ADMINISTRATION OF TPA?

Ideally, TPA should be administered within the first hour of the onset of a heart attack. If there is too long a wait, the heart muscle, deprived of blood supply, will suffer damage.

HOW DO YOU KNOW IF YOU'RE HAVING A HEART ATTACK?

Any sudden discomfort in the chest area is one sign of a heart attack. But this classic symptom of chest pain only occurs in about 50% of heart attack victims. Often there is severe pain in the jaw, neck, or left arm. Dizziness, fainting, sweating, nausea or shortness of breath can also be symptoms. If you suspect that you are having a heart attack, you should be taken as quickly as possible to a hospital that offers 24-hour emergency cardiac care.

IS TPA USED IN CONJUNCTION WITH OTHER MODES OF DIAGNOSIS AND TREATMENT?

Yes. Once a heart attack has been halted by the administration of TPA, the patient remains at risk. Angiography, a diagnostic procedure that enables the medical team to visualize blood flow and pinpoint the location of blockages, may be required. Crucial decisions must then be made, including whether the patient may need bypass surgery or balloon angioplasty (in which a balloon-tipped catheter is used to dilate blocked arteries and restore blood flow). TPA, then, is part of a larger picture. It is not a drug to be used in isolation, but as an important addition to the cardiologist's arsenal.

SEWING CLASS

We can help you fix up those tired clothes and perhaps necourage you to make something new to go with the something still wearable. It's time to "think spring" because in Cleveland if you wait too long winter becomes summer overnight. by and visit us and let me get you outfitted for spring.


A "BIG" THANK YOU


