KITCHEN KORNER

THICK-N-HEARTY SOUP

- 1 marrow bone
- 1/4 or 1/2 lb. meat, optional
- 1-6oz. pkg., "tube", vegetable soup mix
- 1 or 2 carrots, sliced
- 1 stalk celery, sliced
- 1 small potato, diced in small chunks
- 1/4 C. macaroni, of any design
- 1 T. butter or lard
- Small bunch of parsley
- Salt and pepper to taste

Put marrow bone and meat, if desired, with the tube of vegetable soup mix in a pot with 2 quarts of water. Bring to a boil. Skim off any surface film. Reduce heat to low or simmer. Add all other ingredients. Cover and cook, stirring occasionally until vegetables are tender, approximately 1 1/2 hours. If soup gets too thick, add water. Re-season if necessary. Delicious.

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CRANBERRY AND SOUR CREAM SALAD

- 1-6 oz. pkg. cherry jello
- 2 C. hot water
- 1-1 lb. can whole berry cranberries
- 1 pt. sour cream

Dissolve jello in hot water. Mix in cranberry sauce. Gel until soupy, about 2-3 hours. Fold in sour cream. Pour into mold. Refrigerate several hours. Unmold on lettuce leaves. This mold holds its shape beautifully.

Household Hint: The outer green leaves of lettuce are richer in vitamins than the inner ones. Shred them for salads and sandwiches. Leaves and outer stalks of celery are tasty in soups, hot dishes, etc.

CHOCOLATE LOVERS PIE

- 1-9" graham cracker crust
- 1 pt. coffee ice cream
- 6 Heath candy bars, crushed
- 1-1/2 C. chocolate syrup or sauce
- 1 pt. dark chocolate ice cream

Spoon a layer of coffee ice cream into crust. Top with 1/2 of candy. Cover with 1/2 of sauce. Spoon a layer of dark chocolate ice cream on top. Repeat candy layer. Repeat syrup layer. Freeze for several hours or a day ahead. Serves 8. Very rich!

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BAKED CHEESE SANDWICHES

- 8 slices white bread
- Butter or margarine
- 1/2 lb. cheese, sliced thin
- 3 eggs
- 2 C. milk
- Salt to taste

Butter bread on both sides and put 4 slices in a well greased casserole. Sprinkle with half of the cheese. Add second layer of bread and cheese. Beat eggs slightly. Add milk and salt and blend well. Pour over bread and cheese. Use a 9 x 9 square casserole. Bake at 375° for 30-40 minutes. This may be served with undiluted cream of mushroom soup as a cream sauce.

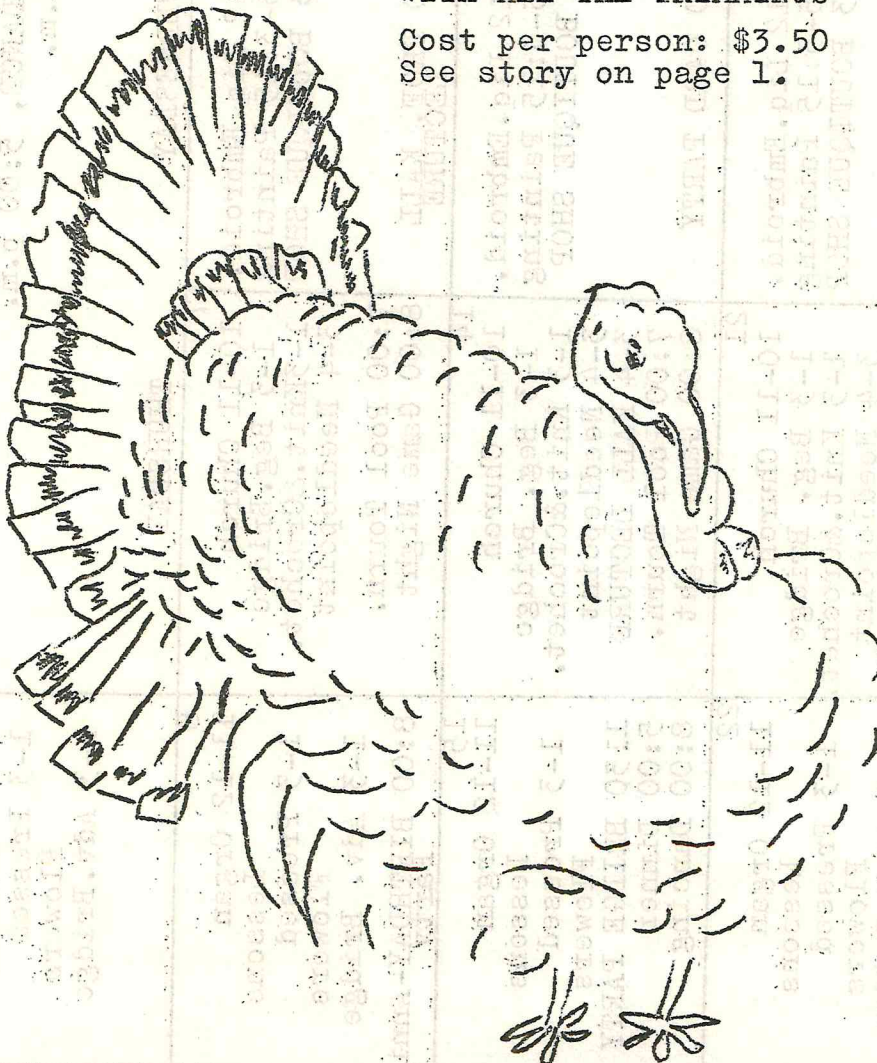
