



SENIORITY: That time of life when you know all the answers-and nobody asks the questions.

Eating habits are ingrained unconscious actions without deliberate mental consciousness. A change of habits requires will power with repetative actions through a period of time to condition unconscious reflexes. Constant eating in restaurants is a definite detriment to ones health because of ignorance in the way food is prepared. As an example, most people think eating fine food will maintain health.

This is falacious. The vitamins and mineral content of food varies to such a degree that vitamin supplements are a must. Most common restaurants keep food in a steam table all day long. Nutritional value is continuously deteriating, first by its original cooking and then by continuous heat that destroys more vitamins by oxidation. Fruit juices, vegetables, prepared fruit and potatoes are usually prepared early in the day. When any food is cut, chopped, cooked or juiced, it loses a great deal of its nutritional value by being subjected to oxygen or water. A case in point are oranges. When you cut oranges the Vitamin C starts to disappear. When you peel them the Vitamin C in the white skin is lost and when they are juiced more Vitamin C is gone by oxidation. So you are getting about 20% of the Vitamin C you need. If you buy oranges in the market as juice it is pasteurized to prevent spoiling thereby making it a worthless So it food to maintain health. is with much of the food we eat to varying degrees. No wonder people become ill eventually. So, get your food direct without processing or fractionating and take some vitamin supplements to assure an adequate daily intake of especially Vitamins C, E, B6 and zinc.


