





Makes 6 to 8 servings

8 oz. rotini, cooked as directed

1 package. (16–20 0z.) Italian sausage links, sliced into 1 in. pieces

1 26 oz. jar four cheese pasta sauce

1 16 oz. package frozen mixed veggies Shredded Parmesan cheese (optional)

In a large skillet, over medium heat, brown sausage, pour off fat. Add pasta sauce and vegetables; bring to a boil. Reduce heat; cover and simmer 10 minutes, stirring occasionally. Serve over hot rotini. Garnish with shredded Parmesan if desired.

From St. Francis of Assisi's Bulletin

Most of us have experienced prejudice at some time in our lives. We were too small, too heavy, too slow, too plain. Whatever the reason, we were excluded, and that hurt. Racism is a particularly ugly form of exclusion.

The Bishops of Illinois cited three facts in a pastoral letter on this subject. 1) Racism is part of the American landscape. 2) Racism is completely contrary to the gospel of Jesus Christ. 3) All baptized Catholics have a moral obligation to work toward the elimination of racism.

The parables of Jesus shattered the ethnic and social prejudices of His people. These little stories praised the compassion of the Good Samaritan, the righteousness of the tax collector, the return of the Prodigal Son. The behavior of Jesus was even more inclusive and risky. Jesus welcomed the excluded, those who the religious elite had pushed to the margins of society.

The bishops concluded by offering some suggestions: 1) Inventory our own hearts to see what must change. 2) Refrain from racist language and jokes. 3) Teach our children to accept people of different races and ethnic groups. 4) Learn to see people through the eyes of Christ.

Finding fault in our neighbor is easy for anyone. We see small faults about others and overlook large faults of our own. How many of us have ever been able to enter into the head of someone we disagree with? If only we could be able to explore others' minds as to what makes them tick. If we could understand their problems, we would have a different perspective.
