Tortellini Soup

3 lbs, Italian sausage

1 large onion, chopped

2 cloves garlic, minced

1 small bag baby carrots

3 cups beef bullion

3½ cups tomato sauce

4 cups tomatoes, drained and crushed

1 cup water

2 tbsps. dried parsley

2 tbsps. dried oregano

½ tsp. celery salt

1 bay leaf

2 (9oz.) packages cheese tortellini, prepared as directed fresh Parmesan cheese

Saute sausage and drain fat. Add onion and garlic and saute until onions are transparent. In a large pot, add all ingredients except tortellini. Simmer for 1½ to 2 hours. Add cooked tortellini and serve. Sprinkle with Parmesan. This soup freezes well, says the book.
