

#### KITCHEN KORNER

#### PEANUT BUTTER BROWNIES

1/4 cup butter or margarine
2 squares (2 cunces) unsweetened
chocolate

1 cup sugar

1/4 cup chunk-style peanut butter 1/2 teaspoon vanilla

2 eggs

1/2 cup sifted all-purpose flour

Melt butter and chocolate over low heat; cool. Blend in sugar, peanut butter, 1/4 teaspoon salt, and vanilla. Beat in eggs, one at a time. Stir in flour. Spread in greased 8x8x2-inch pan. Bake at 350° about 25 minutes.

Wrap extra brownies in moisturevapor-proof material; seal. Label with contents, date. Freeze. Thaw in wrap at room temperature.

## MINT FUDGE TOPPING

1/2 6-ounce package (1/2 cup) semi-sweet mint-flavored chocolate pieces

1/3 cup milk

1/2 cup marshmallow creme

Combine mint-flavored chocolate pieces and milk in small saucepan. Heat slowly, stirring till blended. Beat in marshmallow creme till blended. Serve warm or cold over vanilla ice cream. Top with toasted sliced almonds. Makes about 1 cup sauce.

#### ZIPPY FISH FILLETS

l tablespoon Worcestershire sauce

1½ teaspoons lemon juice 1/2 pound fish fillets Salt and pepper

1/4 cup fine dry bread crumbs

Combine Worcestershire and lemon juice. Cut fish in serving-size pieces. Dip ieces in lemon juice mixture, then season with salt and pepper. Dip in bread crumbs. Bake in greased, shallow pan in an extremely hot oven (500°) about 15 minutes. Serve with lemon wedges or tartar sauce. Makes 2 servings.

#### VEGETABLE RICE PILAF

- 1/3 cup uncooked long-grain rice
  1 tablespoon finely chopped
   onion
- 3 tablespoons butter or margarmargarine
- l chicken bouillon cube
- 1 8-ounce can mixed vegetables

Cook rice and onion in butter 5 to 10 minutes or till lightly browned, stirring frequently. Add 1 cup water, bouillon cube, and 1/4 teaspoon salt. Bring to boil, stirring to dissolve bouillon cube. Reduce heat; cover and cook slowly about 20 minutes or till liquid is absorbed and rice is fluffy. Drain vegetables and stir in; heat through. Serves 2.
