She returned to Cleveland two years later at the age of 76 and was one of the first tenants at the Villa. The carpenters were still working around her when she moved in.

Finally at age 93 Leona retired
for the last time. An article
on her retirement appeared in
the Sun Messanger. She also
received letters from President Reagan and Governor Celeste on her retirement.

Leona has one son, a retired pharmacist; a grandson who is an architect and a granddaughter who is an artist. She also has a brother and sister living in Indiana.


Think back to the days of your childhood when we all dressein costume and went parading around the neighborhood for trick or treat. Fun, definitely.
