

The trauma, emotion, and the concerns of 1974 have come to an end. The Constitution works. The government of our country is strong; the Supreme Court has ruled that no man be he humble or president of the United States is above the rights of the people.

In the synagogues throughout the land on the first day of the Jewish month of "elul," corresponding with the 19th day of August, 1974, the sound of the "shoafar" was heard. The purpose being that those entrusted with sounding the "shoafar" on the high holy days would for each of the twentynine days following arouse the Jews throughout the world to prepare for the high holy days. The 29th day (September 16th) of "elul" is the eve of Rosh Hashanah. The high holy days this year will take on unusual meaning for the memory of the Yom Kippur war of 1973 is still so vivid in our minds.

As we wish each of our Jewish friends a happy sweet New Year, we can only hope that the words of Isaiah will take on greater meaning -- "Peace to him that is far off and also to him that is near."
