
Tom Patterson, a stand-up comedian, was a very nice surprise. His running witticisms were hilarious.



1 cup shortening (part oleo/butter)
1/2 cup brown sugar
2 egg yolks
1 tsp. vanilla
2 cups flour
1/2 tsp. salt

Mix together. Roll into 1 inch balls in slightly beaten 2 egg whites; then roll in chopped nuts. Bake on ungreased pans at 370 degrees. After 5 minutes take out; make thumb print. Return to oven for 8 minutes more. Cool. Put jelly in imprint. Use raspberry or use strawberry adding red coloring.

#### TEN YEARS PAST - TEN YEARS AHEAD


