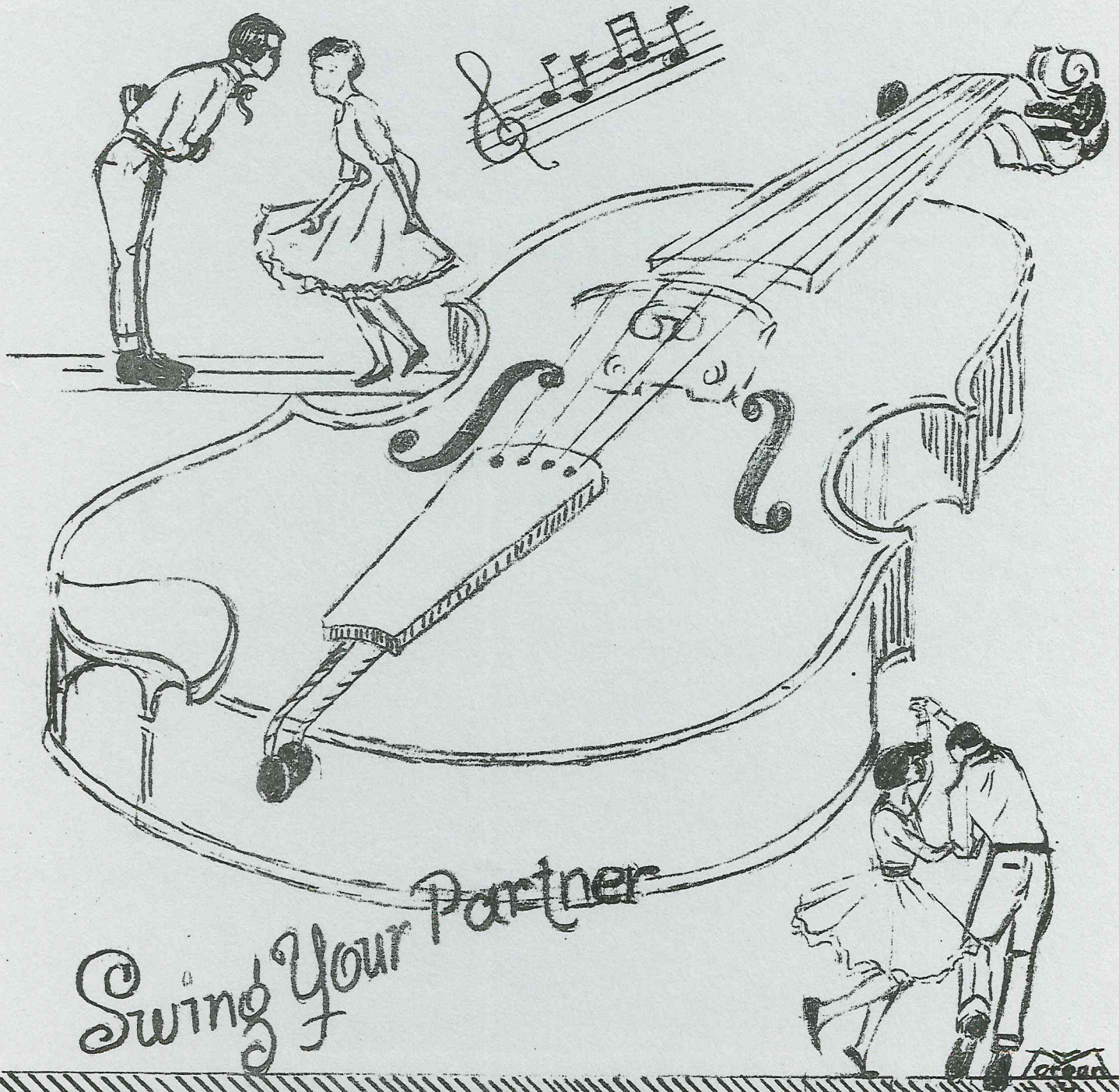

KITCHEN KORNER

PORK CHOPS WITH PINEAPPLE

Bread rather thickly cut chops and fry quickly until golden brown. Place into a low baking pan. On each chop place a ring of pineapple and pour pineapple juice over all.

Bake in a moderate oven about 3/4 to 1 hour. When ready to serve, a maraschino cherry in center of pineapple.

1/2 lb. butter
2 cups sugar

Beat well for 5 minutes.

Add:

2 cups self rising flour
1 tsp. vanilla

Pour in greased and floured tubepan. Bake 350 degrees for 40 minutes or until done.

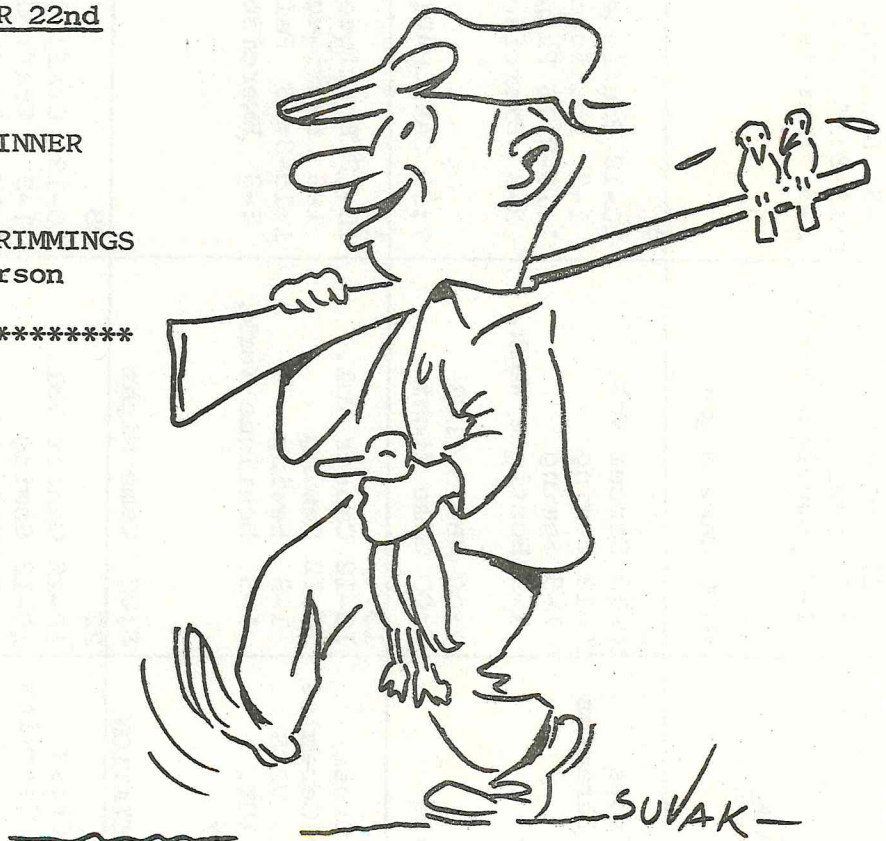

THIS NOTICE HAS BEEN PREPARED IN KEEPING WITH THE ADMINISTRATION'S COMMITMENT TO CONSERVE OUR ENERGY SUPPLIES. IT CONTAINS SUGGESTIONS FOR ENERGY CONSERVATION, WHICH WILL RESULT IN SAVINGS TO THOSE WHO MANAGE AND DWELL IN HUD-INSURED PROJECTS.

THESE INSTRUCTIONS ARE BEING SET FORTH TO ENCOURAGE YOUR ASSISTANCE IN ENERGY CONSERVATION AND WE ASK THAT YOU ATTEMPT TO ADHERE TO THE FOLLOWING GUIDELINES:

1. Keep your thermostat settings at a minimum comfort level.
2. Keep all windows closed, and if your apartment should become overheated, report it to the management.
3. On sunny days, open the curtains and shades to let the sun help heat the apartment.
4. Report dripping faucets and plumbing leaks immediately to management and conserve the use of hot water.
5. Do not block air outlets or returns and radiators with furniture or curtains. Close doors and shut off heating supply to rooms that are seldom used.
6. Conserve the use of cooking equipment and small appliances. TURN OFF LIGHTS, TELEVISION, IRONS AND OTHER APPLIANCES when not in use and when you leave your apartment.
7. Your stoves are absolutely not to be used for heating purposes. They are for cooking only.
8. Wash clothes in cold water with cold water detergents. Use washers and dryers only when they are fully loaded.
